CANOE PROGRAM

1. Flatwater trips - open to all kayak and canoe program members. Notice of these trips is sent to all program members about one week in advance.

2. Ocean Canoeing Course

There will be an RCABC ocean canoeing course run in April and May. The course consists of 12 hours (3 evenings) of classroom sessions and a 2 or 3 day overnight paddling trip in the Gulf Islands on the Victoria Day weekend. Topics covered include chart reading, navigation, tides and currents, weather and risk assessment in addition to canoe tripping topics.

Proposed dates for the evening classroom sessions at the Clubhouse are Tuesday April 22nd, Monday April 28th, and Monday May 5th. Sessions will run from 5.30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

The tripping part of the course is planned for the Victoria Day weekend May 17th - 19th. A 3-day trip is desirable, but this will be discussed with participants if that is too long.

The Basic Tandem canoeing course is a prerequisite to taking this course (unless you only want to do the classroom sessions).

Cost of the course is \$100. If you need charts, a compass and such like, this will add to the cost, as is any transportation for the trip proportion of the course. Anyone who wishes to take the classroom sessions and not take part in the trip is welcome to do so - cost \$50. If you have taken the course in the past, you are welcome to sit in on the classroom sessions and join in the trip for free.

3. Frost Free Weekend - May 10th/11th

The Club has had a tradition of running an overnight camping trip on the Mother's Day weekend, which happens also to be the first weekend of the gardening season that is guaranteed to be free of frost. In the early years of this event, the Club paid for a steak for each member who took part, a policy that has, sadly, had to be dropped as the Club has grown. But we still bring a barbeque, provide baked potato and a fruit grunt for dessert, and you can bring something to cook as suits your taste.

For the first thirty years, the Club camped out on Portland Island, but recently, we have camped out on Blackberry Point on Valdes Island This year the plan is to paddle out to Saltspring Island to camp at a site south of Musgrave Point, opposite Cowichan Bay/Cherry Point. This has been a Forest Recreation site for many years, but has not been much used. There is to be a sign-raising event held there on June 21st, organised by the BC Marine Trails Network Association. In preparation for this, the site needs to be cleaned up a bit - low brush cleared, logs taken off the beach, path from the beach cleared/improved and such like. So the plan is to put in from a site in Cowichan Bay on the Saturday morning and to paddle over to the site and spend some time in the afternoon doing these chores. Saturday evening will be the barbecue and Sunday morning will be either more work or time to explore along the coast to the south a little. There are old forestry roads in the area, and a dirt road leads from Musgrave Landing over Mt. Tuam to Fulford Harbour. The plan is to be back in Victoria mid afternoon.

This trip is open to kayakers and canoeists who have taken the basic courses in the relevant discipline. The crossing to Musgrave Point is about 2 nautical miles, so the trip is suitable for novices. We may well take a voyageur canoe or the Club freighter canoe so that the barbecues and necessary tools can be carried - shovels, saws, etc.

CANOE PROGRAM

January's flatwater paddle had to be postponed because of high winds and rain; river paddles have been cancelled due to either too little or too much water - winter paddling is possible here, unlike in most of Canada, but it isn't always idyllic

February's trip was planned to be off the east side of the Saanich peninsula, if the winds were good, or on Shawnigan Lake if they weren't. The winds were due to rise about mid-day on the Saturday, so Shawnigan was decided on; then the forecast was for 4" of snow on the Malahat. Ummmm. Switch to Saanich Inlet, launching from the Tsartlip Ramp. Snowing alright - large fluffy flakes, with no wind, so they came straight down. Senanus Island was visible through the flurries, but the far shore of Bamberton was hidden. The calm water meant that the reflections of the flakes could be seen as they fell towards the water - white above, black in the water, moving to meet when the flakes hit the water and disappeared with no splash and the tiniest of ripples. Quite magical - like an old film's ending when the reel runs out and you see black with white stars spooling by, only seen with a mirror reflecting this.

No wind, but not warm. After Ron and Shawn got their rudder sorted out, they joined us after the Hagan Creek waterfall and we headed out to Senanus Island. There Julie and Shawn swapped seats and Shawn demonstrated how not to get into a kayak, subsiding gracefully into the shallow but chilly waters of the little cove. After that, there was an incentive to paddle quickly over to Willis Point and round towards Tod Inlet to warm up.

As we neared the entrance, we came across four divers getting into the water. I thought we were a bit daft to be out in the cold, but at least we were dry and above the water. Brrr!

The snow was easing up and the other side of the Inlet could be seen, but still no wind. There was snow lying on the bald and mossy rocks and on the trees on the Gowlland range side of Tod Inlet - quite picturesque. There were lots of small jellyfish in the Inlet, all about a foot or more below the surface - probably due to the freshwater layer from the creek. We had an early lunch at the dock behind Butchart with welcome hot drinks and food. The picnic tables have been moved away from the immediate area of the dock - didn't notice them until we were leaving.

The last part of the trip was a follow-my-leader along the shoreline, under gangplanks, docks, cables and similar obstructions, even under the hull of a large catamaran. All silly, but it adds interest and keeps you flexible as you bend down and sideways to get underneath. Back to the ramp and loaded up to get back to the Clubhouse. About 3.5 hours on the water and the happy thought of getting home mid afternoon with the glow of satisfaction of having done something with the day. Thanks to Ron and Shawn, Julie, Andre and Susan, John and Jill, and, of course, Linda.

Port Angeles Kicks-Off Inaugural Kayak & Film Festival

Port Angeles, Wash., March 13, 2014 - Anyone living in the Pacific Northwest who has toyed with the idea of learning to properly maneuver a kayak or standup paddle board (SUP) won't want to miss a one-of-a-kind event that is coming to their own backyard this next month. Nine experts specializing in all genres of kayaking and SUP will gather in Port Angeles on April 12-13 to offer two days of on-the-water instruction at the inaugural Port Angeles Kayak & Film Festival. Designed for novice to expert level paddlers, classes ranging from introductory sea kayaking and SUP to Eskimo rolling to debacle deterrent and much more will be offered at Hollywood Beach, Crescent Beach, Freshwater Bay, and the Feiro Marine Life Center on Saturday from 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. and on Sunday from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Advance registration is highly recommended.

A corresponding outdoor film festival featuring adventure kayaking expeditions in scenic locations around the world will take place on Saturday, April 12 from 4:30 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. at Port Angeles' Gateway Transit Center Pavilion. Titles include Bhutan: The Last Shangri-La; the Of Souls+Water series; Wildwater; and Mountain Mind Collective, which was filmed on Washington's Olympic Peninsula. The Next Door Gastropub will serve street tacos with beer and wine during the film festival.

Experienced paddlers can test their sea kayaking finesse during the Skills and Obstacle Race at Hollywood Beach. Balance and rescue techniques will be equally challenged, and efforts well-rewarded with a \$100 prize package going to the winner. The fun begins at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 12.

Gulf Island Brigade July 26th to August 1st

Victoria Canoe and Kayak Club's organization of the Gulf Island Brigade from Nanaimo through the world-renowned Gulf Islands to Victoria for a week at the end of July is well under way. It will be the opportunity to enjoy paddling in some of the most beautiful scenery in the world.

The Brigade is now full with nine voyageur canoe teams registered, of which three are from VCKC. Although the teams have been registered, there may be paddler positions still available as some participants back out due to family or work commitments. If anyone is interested in being on a VCKC team they should e-mail their interest to gulfislandbrigade@vckc.ca

Teams are expected to be self sufficient in their canoe. Think 'back packing' in order to limit gear - some of the campsites will be fairly primitive. The tour will be visiting some coastal and island communities, but connecting daily with a road crew will not be possible. The goal is to reduce the environment footprint.

We are also looking for volunteers who may be

interested in being involved in one of the tour's celebrations or driving for the shuttle of paddlers and/or vehicles. There will be a celebration event both at the beginning and end of the trip. The plan is to camp on Newcastle Island just off Nanaimo on the night of July 26th and be at the VCKC Clubhouse on the evening of August 1st.

A shuttle will be organized so that vehicles and boat trailers will be in Victoria when the Brigade arrives. The shuttle will happen on the afternoon of the 26th.

Registration fee is \$1200 per boat of six people, which is \$200 per individual. Other expenses will include team food, travel and equipment expenses, which are organized by individual teams.
