EXECUTIVE ACTIVITY

The executive continues to devote an hour at each executive meeting to develop the first 10-year plan. It will be updatable annually and will assist in capital spending as well as guiding decisions that may make changes to the club activities. Other executive business continues with 1) the history and storage committee delving into their work, 2) the storage committee working on the design and approvals for a revamped storage space and 3) management of issues as they arise.

The VCKC website has programming that will no longer be supported on the web after 2018. Once a realistic estimate for replacing our website is determined, the executive will consider the expense. We are hoping it will be ready before the executive develops the annual budget. A replacement website will be user friendly. It has been suggested that members will be able to maintain and update the content without the assistance of the web master. Our web master role would then become one of site maintenance rather than one of entering all the updates, as is the current situation.

The Harbour Master advised paddlers that the 5-knot speed limit would be enforced on all paddle boats. A group of representatives from paddling groups impacted by this decision is meeting to determine a safe way to train for racing in the area between Selkirk Trestle (walking bridge)

As it turned out, the VCKC's presence provided the only opportunity for folks to demo canoes. And the club's reps were kept busy throughout the day, providing basic instruction to interested paddlers, and promoting the club's instructional program.

In particular, families with youngsters lined up to find out that the open-Canadian canoe are the perfect craft for mom, dad, and a couple of ankle-biters to enjoy our local waterways.

The club's booth also featured a picture display showing VCKC whitewater boaters having fun on Island rivers. The common reaction was, "Wow! I didn't know you could do that in a canoe!" A certain solo playboat brought for demo purposes got a lot of use throughout the day!

And at the end of the day? Consensus among the VCKC reps was, "Let's do this again at next year's Paddlefest!"

VOYAGEUR PROGRAM

Canada Day, Gulf Islands Brigade and the Thompson River Trip

It was a busy summer for the Voyageur program. On July 1st we had Dragon Boat and Voyageur canoe rides for the general public at the Gorge-Tillicum Canada Day picnic. We raised over \$1,300 for Camp Shawnigan at that event. That brings the club total to just shy of \$20,000 raised to support summer camp for children with disabilities. Symphony Splash was another hit. On August 3rd two Voyageur canoes made the trip down to the inner harbour to enjoy an outdoor concert by the Victoria Symphony. We had front-row seating for the show and a great view of the sunset on a warm summer evening. The journey home was particularly fun as we dodged the many small boats also finding their way in the dark.

Gulf Islands Brigade

VCKC hosted its first Voyageur Brigade from July 26th to August 1st. Nine canoes with six paddlers each, and their camping gear for a week, set out from Nanaimo for a six-day journey to Victoria. Stops along the way included: Newcastle Island - Gabriola Island - De Courcy Island - Valdez Island - Transfer Beach - Wallace Island - Galiano Island - Pender Island - Morseby Island - Sidney Island - Island View Beach - VCKC Clubhouse.

Our club had two teams on the brigade that included seven teams from across Canada. It was a pleasure to show off the waters we paddle year round. Feedback was that the weather was well planned with no wind or even a cloud the entire week. Stop by the November general meeting for a slide show and stories.

Big Canoe Sterner Course

The club typically holds a Big Canoe Sterners course in November each year. The specific November date has not been set, but if you are interested, please send an email to voyageur@vckc.ca. The cost will be \$100 per student and includes 16 hours of on-water training. There are prerequisites for this course, but experience counts if you have not had all the courses.

Thompson River Trip

September 13^{th} and 14^{th} , 2014

This is a terrific two-day Voyageur event. The trip requires some planning and logistical arrangements to be made, so if, having read the description below, you want to take part, please let me know by Friday Sept 5th at the latest. At present, about 10 paddlers have signed up for the voyageur canoes, so there is space for 10 more. First come, first served. Paddlers taking their own canoes must have taken and passed the moving water tandem course. Paddlers in Voyageur canoes do not need formal moving water experience.

General Description

This trip runs the Thompson River between the bridge at Savona (Steelhead Provincial Park) and Ashcroft. We will use voyageurs: tandem and solo boats can come if they have airbags. While the big canoes will be provided, bring your own PFD and paddle. No river paddling skills are required if you plan to paddle in a voyageur, but it is helpful to have paddled in one of them before.

The river is large, generally flat, but with a good current. There are some good waves, but nearly all can be avoided if needed. The biggest set of waves comes early on, after the first bridge. Thereafter, they are generally smaller, less severe, and/or more avoidable. The weather is likely to be warm and the river not too cold, although there may be a head wind in the afternoon. Wet suits can be worn, but are not a requirement. There is some history to the area - the Wallachin settlement pre WW1 - and the scenery is lovely. On past experience, the daytime temperatures should be quite warm, but the early mornings and evenings can be chilly.

Accommodation

We camp at Juniper Beach Provincial Park, which is half way between Cache Creek and Savona on the TCH from Cache Creek to Kamloops. The Park is on the banks of the Thompson River. There is tent camping on the lawn there; most users are trailer campers. There are toilets, showers and drinkable water. Sites cannot be booked, but we have not had

any difficulties in past years. For details, see the website

Cost is \$21 per party per night for tent camping, \$25 if hooked up to electricity. The telephone number is 250.457.6794

The site is bracketed by two railway tracks, one next door to the campsite, the other across the river. If you don't like being woken up at night, take ear-plugs to dull the sound of the trains and their whistles. Also note that there are prickly pear cactuses in the scrub/bush beyond the campsite, so don't go beyond the park without thick-soled footwear.

For those who don't camp, there are motels in Cache Creek and Ashcroft. A Club member recommends the Sage Hills Motel in Cache Creek, owned by Hal and Karen Geddes. It has 18 rooms, 4 with kitchens; other rooms have a fridge, coffee maker and microwave upon request. Address Box 126 Cache Creek, VOK 1H0, toll# 1-888-794-4949; E-mail:sagehills@coppervalley.bc.ca.

The hotel is situated on the main street but not too noisy whereas the backside of the building is quieter. I think corporate rates are about \$65 double and \$60 single but these rates need to be verified. Double rooms would probably have 2 beds per room.

There are no restaurants or fast food places near the Juniper Beach campsite - you need to be self-sufficient for food or willing to drive 15 minutes each way to the nearest diner.

Transport

Up to individuals, but if people commit, sharing of vehicles can be arranged. People who are working can catch the 5 p.m. ferry and drive up to Juniper Beach arriving between 11 p.m. and midnight. If you are driving up the Fraser Canyon, Juniper Beach is about 18 km east of Cache Creek - the sign is easily seen. If you go up the Coquihalla, head back towards Cache Creek and the park is 10 km west of the Savona Bridge. On the Sunday, we will leave in time to catch the 7, 8 or 9 o'clock ferry back to Victoria

Thompson River Trip Program Saturday

Drive boats and people up to Savona Bridge, east of Juniper Beach - about 20 minute drive. Unload boats, and then shuttle vehicles to Ashcroft. Drivers return in one vehicle to put-in - about a one-hour shuttle. Paddle down river to Juniper Beach campsite where we have lunch - no need to pack one. Then paddle down to Ashcroft in the afternoon. The take-out is conveniently close to a pub; back to the campsite for dinner.

Sunday

Drive boats to the put-in again, and paddle to Juniper Beach - half day run. We aim to be packed and on the road to Tsawassen by about 2 p.m.

In past years, some members of the Thompson River and Interior Paddling Society (TRIPS) have joined us, which adds to the fun.

Thompson River Trip Costs

Transportation - ferry, gas - obviously reduced if shared. It is about 400 km each way, so work out the costs based on your cars mileage.

Camping - see above. [\$21 per party per night] Food - depends on what you eat and where. We usually have a beer or two in Ashcroft, and some people eat there too.

Boats - paddlers in the voyageur canoes will have to contribute to TRIPS for the use of their voyageur or to pay for the cost of renting and transporting the other voyageur canoes from Maple Ridge. The estimated cost is \$30 per paddler, based on the rental charge for three canoes plus a share of the gas money. [Taking the Club voyageurs would cost the same, due to the ferry fares and require towing the boats further.]

Harbour Speed Limits, Montana Dragon Boat Festival, and Paddle for Health


The Harbor Masters' office has informed all harbour users that the 5-knot speed limit will be enforced. This is in accordance with regulations under the Canada Marine Act. For pretty much the first time, the Harbour Master office will be looking at the speeds of human-powered craft, and pointed out that human-powered boats are required to obey the regulations.

In light of this, the SMU Club at Fairway Gorge Paddling have developed traffic flow patterns for the waters above the Selkirk Trestle as much of their rowing and paddling activities must now be carried out in the restricted waters of Selkirk Water and the narrows above. Basically, they suggest that all boats simply stay to the right-hand side of the channel, so traffic going in opposite directions should not interfere with one another. Be aware that some recreational users (in much slower boats) may not be aware of this practice, and care should be taken to avoid collisions. POLITELY inform them of the preferred routes if possible.

It would be terrific to have some feedback from VCKC because as a group as we will be impacted as well. If you have groups in your program that need to be involved, then please get them involved.
