#### Snow to Surf Relay

The 36<sup>th</sup> Comox Valley Annual Snow to Surf Relay was held on Apr 29<sup>th</sup>. It's a multisport relay race where 117 teams composed of skiers, cyclists, runners, and paddlers pass the baton along an eight-legged relay that started on top of Mt Washington. It ended with a tandem canoe leg at Comox Marina. Paddlers from VCKC's marathon program were recruited for this final leg.

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# Thompson River Trip – August 25 & 26, 2018 Saturday/Sunday,

This is a terrific two-day Voyageur event. The trip requires some planning and logistical arrangements to be made, so if, having read the description below, you want to take part, <u>please let me know by August 18 at the latest.</u> Paddlers taking their own canoes must have taken and passed the moving water tandem course. Paddlers in Voyageur canoes do not need formal moving water experience.

#### **General Description**

This trip runs the Thompson River between the bridge at Savona (Steelhead Provincial Park) and Ashcroft. We will use voyageurs: tandem and solo boats can come if they have airbags. While the big canoes will be provided, bring your own PFD and paddle. No river paddling skills are required if you plan to paddle in a voyageur, but it is helpful to have paddled in one of them before.

The river is large, generally flat, but with a good current. There are some good waves, but nearly all can be avoided if needed. The biggest set of waves comes early on, after the first bridge. Thereafter, they are generally smaller, less severe, and/or more avoidable. The weather is likely to be warm and the river not too cold, although there may be a head wind in the



afternoon. Wet suits can be worn, but are not a requirement. There is some history to the area – the Wallachin settlement pre WW1 – and the scenery is lovely. On past experience, the day time temperatures should be quite warm, but the early mornings and evenings can be chilly.

#### Accommodation

We camp at Juniper Beach Provincial Park, which is half way between Cache Creek and Savona on the TCH from Cache Lytton to Kamloops. The Park is on the banks of the Thompson River. There is tent camping on the lawn there; most users are trailer campers. There are toilets, showers and drinkable water. Sites cannot be booked, but we have not had any difficulties in past years. The site is bracketed by two railway tracks, one next door to the campsite, the other across the river. If you don't like being woken up at night, take ear-plugs to dull the sound of the trains and their whistles. Also note that there are prickly pear cactuses in the scrub/bush beyond the campsite, so don't go beyond the park without thick-soled footwear.\_For those who don't camp, there are motels in Cache Creek and Ashcroft.

There are no restaurants or fast food places near the Juniper Beach campsite – you need to be self-sufficient for food or willing to drive >15 minutes each way to the nearest diner.

#### **Transport**

Up to individuals, but if people commit, sharing of vehicles can be arranged. People who are working can catch the <u>5pm</u> ferry and drive up to Juniper Beach arriving <u>between 11pm and midnight</u>. If you are driving up the Fraser Canyon, Juniper Beach is about 18kms east of Cache Creek – the sign is easily seen. If you go up the Coquihalla, head back towards Cache Creek and the park is < 10 kms west of the Savona Bridge. On the Sunday, we will leave in time to catch the 7, 8 or 9 o'clock ferry back to Victoria

# PROGRAM Saturday

Drive boats and people up to Savona Bridge, east of Juniper Beach – about a 20 minute drive. Unload boats, then shuttle vehicles to Ashcroft. Drivers return in one vehicle to put-in – about a 1 hr shuttle. Paddle down river to Juniper Beach campsite where we have lunch – no need to pack one. Then paddle down to Ashcroft in the afternoon. The take-out is conveniently close to a pub; back to the campsite for dinner.

#### Sunday

Drive boats to the put-in again, and paddle to Juniper Beach – half day run. We aim to be packed and on the road to Tsawassen by about 2pm.

In past years, some members of the Thompson River and Interior Paddling Society (TRIPS) have joined us, which adds to the fun

#### COSTS

Transportation – ferry, gas – obviously reduced if shared. It is about 400km each way, so work out the costs based on your cars mileage.

Camping - see above.

Food – depends on what you eat and where. We usually have a beer or two in Ashcroft, and some people eat there, too. Boats – paddlers in the voyageur canoes will have to contribute to TRIPS for the use of their voyageur or to pay for the cost of renting and transporting the other voyageur canoes from Maple Ridge. The estimated cost is \$30 per paddler, based on the rental charge for three canoes plus a share of the gas money. [Taking the Club voyageurs would cost the same, due to the ferry fares and require towing the boats further.]

#### Kayak Program Update

Two Kayak Basic Skills courses were completed in the spring and one is scheduled for June, so there are a number of VCKC members who are better equipped to get out on the water and be safe. There is also a two-day, Level 1 Kayak course scheduled for June, which is designed for the intermediate paddler – and the course is full!

July is the month when we begin our "Tuesday Night Paddles" on the Gorge. This is an opportunity to join with other VCKC members who are interested in kayaking and canoeing and work together to practice paddle stokes or just to take leisurely paddles up the Gorge and back. There is often an experienced paddler in the crowd who is willing to share their knowledge. Also, this is a good time to find a partner to practice re-entry techniques after a wet exit. Come out and join in the fun! Meet on the water at the clubhouse Tuesday evenings, beginning Tuesday July 3<sup>rd</sup> at 5:30pm. Club kayaks are available for this activity.





Club kayaks are for VCKC members use when taking courses or clinics, or when participating in club sanctioned paddles (Tuesday NightPaddles,day trips and camping). These kayaks are also available to VCKC members for personal use on the Gorge Waterway - on the club side of the Tillicum Bridge only. Members must have successfully completed the Paddle Canada Kayak Basic Skills course or have equivalent skills. Members using club kayaks must always paddle with one or more "buddies". If you would like to borrow a club kayak contact Linda Hall at kayakbooking@vckc.ca to reserve one.


### Running of the Cows (by Joe Boyd)

The river was running at a generous level all weekend, at bout 60 cms.

# Celebrating VCKC 50 th. Anniversary


